GUSTAV MAHLER (1860-1911)

(according to Mahler's instructions, there will be a few moments' silence between the first and second movements)

Mahler's questioning of the meaning of life and death is the philosophical background to almost all his music. Of the first movement of the second Symphony, he wrote: "We are standing beside the coffin of a man beloved. For the last time his life, his battles, his sufferings and his purpose pass before the mind's eye What is life - and what is death? Is it all an empty dream or has this life of ours, and our death, a meaning?" The opening movement is a heroic funeral celebration, followed by two movements in the nature of reflective interludes, reminiscent of both the happier aspects of life as well as life's bitterness and irony. In the last two movements, Mahler literally addresses the questions posed symbolically in the first movement. For the contralto solo of the fourth movement, he chose a text from Des Knaben Wunderhorn, the collection of folk poems on which he drew so often. The song leads directly to the finale which begins with a long orchestral section before a setting of the poem which gives the Symphony its name, Resurrection, by the 18th century German poet, Friedrich Klopstock. Mahler himself added the final verses, from the words "O believe, my heart", which bring the Symphony to triumphant resolution.

Mahler conducted the first performance of the complete Symphony in Berlin in December, 1895.

Rise again, yea, thou shalt rise again, My dust, after short rest!
Immortal life! Immortal life
He who called thee will grant thee.

To bloom again art thou sown! The Lord of the Harvest goes And gathers in, like sheaves, Us who died!

O believe, my heart, O believe Nothing is lost with thee! Thine is what thou hast desired, What thou hast lived, What thou hast fought for!

O believe, Thou wert not born in vain! Hast not lived in vain, Suffered in vain!

What has come into being Must perish! What perished must rise again! Cease from trembling! Prepare thyself to live!

O Pain, thou piercer of all things!
From thee have I been wrested!
O Death! Thou masterer of all things!
Now art thou mastered!
With wings which I have won me,
In love's fierce striving,
I shall soar upwards
To the light to which no eye has soared!
I shall die, to live!

Rise again, yea thou wilt rise again, My heart, in the twinkling of an eye! What thou hast fought for shall lead thee to God!
