

INTRODUCTION

The present Directory supplies information about music graduates in a more systematic way than newsletters can accomplish. Furthermore it gathers a variety of factual records relating to the history of the Faculty of Music and our Alumni Association.

The main section lists in alphabetical order all living holders of music degrees from the University of Toronto as well as those who passed away since 1956. Diploma graduates and those who attended degree courses but did not graduate regrettably had to be omitted. Entries sketch briefly a graduate's career after graduation. To find the members of your class turn to the Class Lists at the end of the volume. These are arranged by year and include also those deceased before 1956.

Alumni House assures us that the questionnaire we sent out last September met greater response than any sent out by other faculties for their directories. Over half of our questionnaires were filled in and provided the information (in a few cases enlarged or condensed by the editors) for entries in the Directory. Unfortunately we could not locate all graduates and others ignored our request for information. For all these we have attempted to provide material from various printed and personal sources. However, there were obvious limits to our research; to telephone all 40 or 50 Toronto residents who did not reply was out of the question. On the other hand no effort was spared to complete our name list and to trace addresses. Mrs. Doris Cull, Assistant Head of the Department of Graduate Records patiently helped to compare the records - often at odds with one another - provided by commencement and other lists. As a result of our investigations about one quarter of all music alumni addresses have been revised during the last few months, a fact which reflects the great mobility of musicians rather than any inadequacy in the university's system of keeping track of them.

While many of the data in this volume were extracted from official university records and publications, their presentation here does not assume the status of an official university document. All responsibility for accuracy rests with the Music Alumni as a private organization separate from the university.

A word about the origin and production of the Directory. David Fox suggested the idea to me as the new vice-president at our annual meeting, Easter 1962. As a delayed consequence of his fateful remark, David was nominated and elected vice-president a year later. Together with him and Jane Cook, our secretary-treasurer plans were elaborated. Happily our scheme coincided with the desire of Alumni House to sponsor just this sort of publication. Full co-operation was received from Mr. Joe Evans, Director of Alumni Affairs, Miss Thelma Brown, Senior Assistant and other staff members of Alumni House in the mailing and collecting of the questionnaires and the physical production of the Directory. We express our gratitude to them and to the following: Dr. Arnold Walter for writing the Preface, Professor Robert Rosevear for helpful suggestions, Mrs. Phyllis McLaine for some of the preliminary typing, and Mrs. Patricia Clunis for editing a section of the questionnaires. Finally we thank all those who supplied information about themselves and their former classmates.

PRE-HISTORY AND HISTORY OF THE FACULTY OF MUSIC

- 1843 University of King's College opened for instruction.
- 1844 A statute establishes a Chair of Music.
- 1845 James Paton Clarke said to be appointed music instructor.
- 1846 First bachelor of music degree in Canada awarded to Clarke.
 His thesis an eight-part anthem "Arise, O Lord God, Forget Not The
 Poor".
- 1855 University of Trinity College calendar lists George William Strathy as professor of music.
- 1856 First Doctor of Music degree in Canada awarded to Clarke by University of Toronto.
- 1858 Strathy awarded Doctor of Music degree by Trinity.
- Trinity's student paper complains: We have "a Professor Strathy, but we have seen nothing of him no graduates no lecture no examinations it is time for a change".
- Trinity College draws up a music syllabus and institutes three annual examinations towards the Bachelor of Music degree. The final examination includes Harmony, Counterpoint, Canon, Fugue, History, Form, Use of Instruments. A Doctor degree examination may be taken three years later. A song or anthem in at least 6 parts with orchestral accompaniment is required.
- 1885 Trinity College appoints a registrar in England in order to hold examinations simultaneously in both countries.
- 1886 Trinity College confers 4 degrees.
- 1890 Toronto College of Music affiliates with University of Toronto and prepares candidates for the Bachelor of Music degree now offered by the University.
- Between 1886 and 1891 193 candidates in England and Canada applied for a Trinity music degree and 89 degrees bachelor and doctor were awarded. Following a dispute between British professors of music and Trinity College, in which the value of the Canadian in absentia degrees was questioned, Trinity ceases to accept candidates in Great Britain in 1891.
- Toronto Conservatory of Music affiliates with University of Toronto and prepares candidates for degree examinations. Degree examiners in this decade include: F. Archer, W.E. Fairclough; A.E. Fisher and S.P. Warren.

- 1900's University of Toronto music degree examiners include: H. Anger, W.E. Fairclough, A.Ham, C.M.L. Harris, S.P. Warren and H.A. Wheeldon.
- 1914 Healey Willan appointed lecturer and examiner, University of Toronto.
- 1918 Faculty of Music created. The Toronto College of Music, the Toronto Conservatory of Music and the Hamilton Conservatory of Music disaffiliate with the University of Toronto.
- Augustus Stephen Vogt, principal of the Toronto Conservatory of Music becomes the first dean of the faculty. Herbert Austin Fricker, Albert Ham, Ferdinand Albert Mouré and Healey Willan form the staff.
- 1921 University of Toronto assumes control of Toronto Conservatory of Music.
- 1925 Ernest MacMillan appointed lecturer in church music.
- 1926 Augustus Stephen Vogt dies.
- 1927 Ernest MacMillan appointed dean.
- 1937 Healey Willan appointed professor.
- 1938 Leo Smith appointed professor.
- 1946 Bachelor degree course in School Music instituted; the old course becomes General Music. Leslie Bell, Thomas Canning and Robert Rosevear appointed assistant professors.
- 1947 Undergraduate Association formed. Thomas Canning resigns and is replaced by Richard Johnston, assistant professor.
- 1948 S. Drummond Wolff appointed lecturer and instructor, Godfrey Ridout appointed special lecturer.
- 1949 19 graduate in first School Music class.
- 1950 Leo Smith and Healey Willan retire, though Willan remains university organist. George Frederick Loughlin appointed associate professor.
- Reorganization of Royal Conservatory of Music into a Faculty of Music (Arnold Walter appointed director) and a School of Music (Ettore Mazzoleni appointed principal). Sir Ernest MacMillan retires as dean. Courses leading to degrees and to Artist and Licentiate diplomas are given by the Faculty. Leslie Bell and S. Drummond Wolff retire. Oskar Morawetz and John Weinzweig appointed lecturers, John Beckwith and Charles Peaker special lecturers, Talivaldis Kenins instructor.
- Boyd Neel appointed dean of Royal Conservatory. Robert Rosevear appointed assistant to the director of the Faculty of Music. Name of School Music course changed to Music Education. George Frederick Loughlin resigns.

- 1954 Master of Music two-year attendance course instituted. Harvey Olnick appointed associate professor.
- 1956 First Master of Music degree awarded to E. John Fenwick.
- 1958 Myron Schaeffer appointed assistant professor.
- 1960 Ezra Schabas appointed special lecturer.
- 1961 Edward Johnson Building cornerstone laid April 20 by Mrs. George Drew.
- 1962 Faculty of Music moves to Edward Johnson Building.
- Bachelor of Music courses extended from three to four years.

 MacMillan Theatre opened in new building. Gustav Ciamaga appointed assistant professor.
- 1964 Official opening of Edward Johnson Building and MacMillan Theatre, March 2.
