Chabrier's L'Étoile, a masterpiece of French comic opera, was first performed in 1877. It is the Opera Division's major production of the year. The complete resources of the Opera Division, augmented by the University of Toronto opera chorus and orchestra, will be directed towards the production of this unusual and attractive work.

Stephen Ralls will conduct, with Michael Patrick Albano directing.

# Students and Faculty Honour Alice Matheson


Alice Matheson, in memory of her brother Armen, has left a bequest to the Faculty of Music for an endowment fund. This fund will help provide yearly scholarships to students intending to pursue classical performance careers in piano or orchestral strings, giving preference to the piano and next to the violin.

Though he made his living as a professional engineer, Armen was a proficient pianist. It is his grand piano that still stands in Ms. Matheson's living room today. "I always believed," she says, "that he would have been much happier if he had been able to pursue a career as a concert pianist. In endowing the scholarships in his memory, I am perpetuating his name and helping students do what Armen would have loved to do."

Ms. Matheson is also bequeathing his piano to the Faculty of Music.

She recalls the pieces Armen Matheson loved to play the most: Beethoven's Pathetique Sonata, Schubert's Trout Quintet and Golliwog's Cakewalk by Debussy.

On November 26, 1996, the Faculty of Music honoured Ms.

## Walter Homburger Scholarship

Stephen Tam, a second-year undergraduate student in Performance (Flute) is the 1996-97 recipient of the Walter Homburger Scholarship.

Born in Hong Kong, Tam started playing the flute ten years ago, at the age of nine. He has been studying privately for nine years. Moving with his family to Unionville, he began studying with Diane Aitken, a flautist and the daughter of Robert Aitken.

He now studies with Douglas Stewart at the Faculty of Music. Describing the early twentieth century as his favourite era of musical composition, Tam cites Stravinsky, Ravel and Debussy as among his favourite composers.

Tam is a member of the Toronto Symphony Youth Orchestra as well as the Faculty of Music Woodwind Quintet and the University of Toronto Symphony Orchestra, which will be performing Stravinsky's Les Noces and Rite of Spring on April 5.

#### New Dean: David Beach

The Faculty of Music recently appointed David Beach (M.M., M.Phil., Ph.D. Yale) to the position of Dean. Dean Beach is a former Dean of Graduate Studies at the University of Rochester (New York). Previous to that appointment, he was the Chair of the Department of Music Theory at the University's Eastman School of Music, and a member of the faculty there for twenty-two years. His publishing history includes thirty articles in refereed journals, including the Journal of Music Theory, of which he is a past editor. He was co-translator of The Art of Strict Musical Composition (1771-1779) by J.P. Kirnberger, and editor of Aspects of Schenkerian Theory (1983). He is currently preparing, as co-editor, a collection of nineteen essays celebrating the seventieth birthday of Allen Forte, Professor of Music at Yale University.

Growing up in New England and upper New York State, Dean Beach studied piano and clarinet, but "I've never considered a career as a performer. I wish I were more accomplished as a performer, but I would never have wanted a performance career. My natural inclination is to take music apart and find out how it works."

Dean Beach intends to spend some of his time in the classroom next year, teaching a seminar in atonal and twelve-tone theory, and he is planning a series of three open lectures on

Schubert's music.

"I think that there are a great many wonderful things that go on at the Faculty of Music. The difficulty we face is that we must try to maintain a large number of focuses during a time of severe budget cuts. But the spirit at the Faculty is very strong. There's a real desire to move ahead, to achieve an even higher level of excellence than we've seen here before and I find the enthusiasm really healthy."

On behalf of the Faculty of Music and U of T, we welcome Dean Beach to Toronto. -Ed.

The Metro Quartet has been invited by the University in Graz, Austria to attend International Week in Graz. Daniel Bard (violin), Max Mandel (violin), Aislinn Nosky (viola), and Rachel Mercer (cello), as well as accompanying personnel, will be guests of the University of Graz for the week of March 7 - 14, 1997.

Also invited is Gregory Oh, a student in the Master's Degree Program in Performance (piano). He will perform the Bartok 3rd Piano Concerto in the Graz Stefaniensaal on March 13th, 1997.

Other groups attending are three student ensembles from Prague, London, and Helsinki. Each ensemble will perform a complete recital, participate in coaching sessions with University of Graz faculty and participate in other cultural events.



A member of the Moe Koffman Quintet, Downing has performed with numerous local musicians including Ed Bickert, Kirk McDonald, Don Thompson, Sam Noto, Mike Malone and Bernie Senensky.

# The Greta Kraus Scholarships

The Faculty has received an anonymous pledge of \$25,000 to endow scholarships in honour of Greta Kraus.

Vienna-born Greta Kraus began to teach at the conservatory in 1943, and later at the faculty where she formed the Collegium Musicum and began to hold the Lieder classes that are already legendary. The vibrancy of her personality, her knowledge, the richness of her musicianship, and the totality and intensity of her devotion to music have inspired and informed generations of young musicians, and set a standard for all those who know and admire her.

Because it was pledged before March 31, 1997, the monetary value

of the Greta Kraus scholarship has tripled.

The Greta Kraus pledge was made at a wonderful time, because right now, until March 31, 1997, every dollar pledged to undergraduate and graduate student aid will be matched two to one by the University and the Government of Ontario, provided pledges are received before the deadline. Donors retain the right to direct the tripled amount to the faculty of their choice.
